

Collect & Readings for Third Sunday of Advent Collect:

O Lord Jesus Christ, who at your first coming sent your messenger to prepare your way before you: grant that the ministers and stewards of your mysteries

may likewise so prepare and make ready your way by turning the hearts of the disobedient to the wisdom of the just,

that at your second coming to judge the world we may be found an acceptable people in your sight; for you are alive and reign with the Father in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever.

Old Testament Reading: Isaiah 35. 1-10

¹ The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus ² it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing.
The glory of Lebanon shall be given to it, the majesty of Carmel and Sharon.

They shall see the glory of the Lord, the majesty of our God.

³ Strengthen the weak hands, and make firm the feeble knees.

⁴ Say to those who are of a fearful heart, 'Be strong, do not fear!

Here is your God.

He will come with vengeance, with terrible recompense.

He will come and save you.'

⁵ Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, and the ears of the deaf unstopped;

Benefice Bulletin for 14th December 2025

Lucia Day, 13th December, is a great festival day in Sweden with traditional ceremonies occurring in homes and workplaces all over the country - saffron buns (rather than mince pies) are a must. What follows is mostly drawn from the Church of Sweden's website.

The celebration of Lucia - the name come from the Latin word for light - has its background in folk beliefs, legends and historical facts. Today its potent symbolism (candles brought into the darkness) reminds us that hope endures even in the darkest of times because God is always with us.

Lucia is a historical figure who was born in Syracuse, Sicily in the 280s. It is also historically proven that she was martyred for her faith. In the Catholic tradition, she is the patron saint of the blind. In Roman society, being a Christian was a crime in Lucia's time. Lucia was probably killed in 304 during the Emperor Diocletian's persecution of Christians. She would have been, therefore, no older than 25.

The legends about Lucia are many and the details are probably of variable veracity. She was born into a wealthy family and it is said that as a child she decided never to marry and to give everything she owned to the poor.

When Lucia was betrothed to a man who did not share her Christian faith, she was distraught. Legend has it that she gave her dowry to the poor and that her fiancé became so furious that he revealed that she was a Christian and she was put to the sword.

In Sweden, 13th December was a special day long before the custom of Lucia processions came into being. Lucia night was the longest night of the year according to the Julian calendar. Folk belief had it that that night was dangerous – supernatural powers were on the move. People stayed awake, eating to avoid falling asleep.

In Germany there was a tradition of a girl being dressed up as a 'Christkindlein', a baby Jesus with lighted candles in her hair representing a halo. In western Sweden the tradition was taken up among the nobility, but here it was an adult woman who brought food to the farm people while they were keeping vigil. She was dressed in white and had candles in her hair.

The Lucia procession's Starboys have their own history. In some places, young boys went from house to house at Christmas time, sang a few songs and finally asked for money. The boys were dressed in white shirts with ostrich hats on their heads, representing the three wise men, King Herod and Judas.

The modern Lucia celebration took off when the newspaper Stockholms Dagblad arranged the first public Lucia procession in 1927. At first, Lucia appeared alone or with one or two companions. Gradually, she gained a retinue of bridesmaids and Starboys. In pre-schools today, Santa Claus and gingerbread men also have their place.

Lucia Day is a Saint's Day and many churches hold Lucia services. In London, Lucia services are put on for the benefit of ex-pat Swedes at the Swedish Church in Marylebone and for wider audiences in St Paul's Cathedral – and this year in Westminster Cathedral also.

In some respects the Lucia procession is like a Christingle service and the two work well in a single ceremony. Maybe we could try that next year in Astwell.
